

Court Farm All Saints Comm. Soc. meeting
held at 11.15 on Jan 14. 8.15 pm.
Feb. October 1875.

Before officially starting the meeting
and before we joined those present
being: Messrs. Webb Stone Strand Truold

and Mr. Thidman Sheehan Giles, & others,
that Mr. Strand had just returned
from the R. H. S. Westminister National
Show having gained the following:

The Riddell Trophy.

Trophy for most points in show.

1st Prize Collection of mice. 3.
1st Prize Collection of fish. 1.
2nd Prize Collection of trout. 4.
and others which in his words,
excitement could not immediately recalled
but in all

Eight fish and six seconds.

Needless to say congratulations
were freely given by all present,
and Mr. Strand attended each
who attended the "Red Lion"
Public House after this meeting a
drink of their choice in celebration.

The minute were then read and proposed as a free record of the last meeting by the President seconded by Mr. Hall. Carried unanimously.

Matters arising:

1. Reference Mr. Jarvis, we are subsequently informed that he is out of the skating list.

2. Mr. Green had indicated that the Marlston Dressing Rooms has a $3\frac{1}{4}$ " water supply and he will approach them to let us take a supply from it.

3. Mr. Friend said that \$100.00 has been given by the City Council to Stables under the condition that the \$500.00 required for the entrance roadway, the remainder to be come from the Marlston Parish Council and the City Council equally. The Stables Committee stated that the \$1000.00 has now become \$500.00 and that \$500 would be left.

4. The Ship has been removed,

5. The soil has been delivered to the old site.

D. K. Perkins reported on his visit at
Committee request to see Mr. Stevens:

Mr. Stevens had said: ~~at~~ ^{the} Charles ~~the~~ Committee
for them not voice nothing with
me while I was there today, and
I am touched that they show
concern over my resignation; I am
very sorry to leave especially in
this way, when now, being retired
I was looking forward to the
work associated with the allotments,
and its running. However I am
not prepared to serve in any
capacity as things stand, should
things at the next A.G.M. after
and I am again opposed I
could well be prepared to serve
again. But I think it best to
let everything die and wait
until then.

Mr. Fin told opposed that Mr. Stevens
resignation be accepted with
reluctance. He spoke asked him
to add "great reluctance" which
he agreed to, seconded by Mr. Stone.

The resignation motion was carried
by 14 for and 1 against.
Mr. Perkins being strongly criticised
for voting against the motion,
by a committee member who considered
his action silly:

It was then proposed that we advise the 1976 committee of our wishes for a gift to be made to the Boston in recognition of his 27 years service to the Association in the approximate value of \$2500 (Twenty five pounds). The gift to be a solidly stainless steel fork, and a gift for the home of an indebted barometer both having strong association with allotments.

Propose J. K. Perkins Secunder H. Stoud.

The proposal was carried for and / against.

Secretarys honorarium be paid to Mr. Bowen for this year in the sum of \$1500 (Fifteen pounds)

Proposed Mr. Stoud.
Carried Mr. Stoud.

Unanimously agreed.

Before audit Mr. Sheehan suggested we pay for the meeting rooms.
Mr. Stoud then was treasurer agreed.

Mr. Stoud proposed that at this years A. G. M. voting will be by slip and nominations must be in writing before the meeting for the positions of Executive & Committee.

Mr. Sheehan questioned why a "slip" vote?
Mr. Stoud said because this is

done at Tetersten and works
very well.

Mr. Field suggested an outright
challenge of all these. "You have
had your means about the committee
now I come to the A.G.M. and have
your vote and say."

Mr. Stone related that there are
25 cents outstanding: 175 paid.

They are still coming forward to
pay and he (Mr. Stone) suggested that
we wait for a further week before
we consider further action.
Mr. Stroud and Stone will act as
telling re-letters to non-payers before
next meeting.

The A.G.M. were paid \$57.33. (Still 14.67
pounds thirty three pence) This week
being the bank and also the rent
until next March 1976.

\$151.57 The rent account is in credit
\$30.00 still to be paid for thoroughing
\$40.00 to transfer with the general
account due to a minor
accounting error re-purchase
of shield banners and other
things.

General account \$70.00 in bank & some
to pay out to Baxter's though
a refund figures we have over
\$60.00 probably \$75.00 when accounting
is finalized.

Mr. Shand said Munis will give 50%
discount if we do not take seed
on a sale or return basis, but
take on a direct sale. Sale ~~and~~
or return they will give us 35% discount.
Munis offer 35% but Mr. Shand
prefers Munis. We will write away
for us at the same time as he
does for the Federation. He suggested
that Debbie's should still be used
for the athletes who place firm cash
with order, orders agreed.

The Purchasing Committee to decide
levels of seed purchase etc, but
council advised them to order 150
pounds of time for resale through the
Seed.
